#### **Land Conservation Update**

In 2023 Legacy proudly partnered with landowners on Amisk Lake in Athabasca County to sign the 38-acre Amiscape Conservation Easement, to conserve natural boreal forest. The owners were particularly grateful as they had been looking for an organization to work with for 15 years.

This signing brings our total number of completed conservation easements (CEs) to 15, totalling 3277 acres.

In 2023 we also had 6 CE projects-in-progress amounting to about 1170 ac.

#### **Conservation Easement Stewardship**

Legacy hired two summer Conservation Coordinators to carry out our visits to CE properties in 2023.

Rose Chong-Wu and April Krahn joined Legacy at the beginning of May and visited 14 Legacy CEs before the end of August. The 15<sup>th</sup> easement, Amiscape, had a monitoring visit completed by a local volunteer using Legacy's documentation template.

The visits include a review of past information collected about the CE property, a conversation with

the landowner to learn about changes over the last year, a site visit that includes taking photos at set photo points, writing a report to document the visit, and a follow-up discussion with the landowner to share findings and notes.

In addition to monitoring visits, Rose and April updated Legacy's Health and Safety program materials, planned the Buttercup Blitz weed-pull event, assisted with the Bergen Pasture Management Field Day and attended learning sessions to grow their skills in the field.

#### Water Quality and You 2.0

The Water Quality and You 2.0 (WQY2.0) outreach program along the Little Red Deer River continued in 2023. Outreach efforts included mailouts to landowners along the Little Red and a field day in late June held in partnership with Cows & Fish, Mountain View County, ALUS and the Grey Wooded Forage Association.

A new staff member was hired to focus on delivery of WQY2.0 beginning in January 2024—welcome back to Legacy, Rose Chong-Wu!

The value of Legacy Land Trust Society's Conservation Easements increased in 2023 to \$7,999,300 from \$7,453,300 at the end of 2022. Legacy's total net assets at the end of 2023 increased to \$9,484,764 from \$\$8,862,612 at the end of 2022. (Note: Conservation Easements comprising the bulk of these net assets reflect their book value and cannot be sold or borrowed against.)

Endowment fund investment at year-end 2023 totalled \$512,620. It consisted of \$320,000 invested in the Mawer Balanced Fund through a direct investment account with ATB Securities Inc., and \$192,620 invested with the Red Deer & District Community Foundation.

Legacy's primary source of funding continues to be the Alberta Land Trust Grant Program (ALTGP). This Alberta government program is critical in allowing Legacy to partner with landowners to conserve land with significant ecological, agricultural and heritage values. The ALTGP was established under the Public Lands Act which places a portion of the proceeds from public land sales into a Land Stewardship Fund.

**ALTGP** grants received by Legacy to date have been for projects primarily with ecological value. Funding for two projects (\$264,700) was received in 2023 based on applications submitted in September 2022. ALTGP funds are typically spent over a 2-3 year period. Unspent grant funding is restricted, and these deferred contributions remain liabilities until spent.


Revenues and Expenses were both significantly lower in 2023 compared to 2022 (\$196,113 vs \$303,209 and \$196,475 vs 276,361 respectively).

Including unrealized gain on marketable securities, excess of revenue for 2023 was \$12,738 vs \$26,848 in 2022.
